# Sheriff Race Result Challenged

Recounting of votes cast for the office of Sheriff of Casa County in the Nov. 6 General Election will begin Wednesday, Dec. 5, at 9 a.m., County Clerk Chas. Land said today. The recount was ordered Mon-

day by writ issued by District Judge John M. Dierks after incumbent Sheriff Tom Solomon filed a Notice of Contest of the Election in District Court Monday morning.

Solomon, defeated 2,389 to 2,-360 by Republican Fred Tesch Nov. 6 according to the official vote canvass, claimed in his notice that "illegal votes were received and legal votes were rejected at the polls in sufficient number to change the result of the election."

The writ ordered Land to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots, compare the list of voters in the poll books and cer-

tify the result to the Court. Land served Solomon and Tesch Wednesday with notices of his Intention to proceed Wednesday at 9 a.m.

Only Land and the candidates and/or their attorneys can be present for the recount.
