Twelve players have been designated by Coach Lowell Johnson for varsity basketball berths at Plattsmouth High School as the season opener nears.

Two others are "pushing for varsity berths," Johnson said. On the varsity squad now are: Roger Beverage, 6-4; Dan Schultz, 6-4; Butch McGraw, 5-7; Bill Nettelmann, 5-11; Tom Hansen, 5-10; Jim Bieri, 5-10; Roger Lanum, 6-4; Bob McClanahan, 6-3; Roger Heedum, 5-9; Lee Pritchard, 5-9; Gary Christensen, 6-1; Greg Taylor, 5-9.

Not far off varsity form are Ron Richards, 5-10, and Ed Frazier, 6-1.

McClanahan is still limping from an ankle fracture that sidelined him early in the football season and had him inactive until the start of basketball work.

Jim Bieri is also nursing an ankle sprain.

Beverage, who played at about 215 pounds last basketball season, is down to 190 pounds. Johnson has been working him in sweat clothes much of the practice season to help him get down to better playing weight. Johnson's varsity and Coach Bob Medina's Reserves open here Dec. 7 against Papillion.

Special DeSoto Season Upcoming

LINCOLN — Rifle hunting for deer is still on the NEBRASKA-land schedule, with 250 hunters holding permits for the special mid-December season in the DeSoto Refuge.

The hunt runs December 15 through 17 and encompasses 3,200 acres of land open to Nebraska hunters. One deer of either sex is legal, with shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Nebraska's portion of the refuge is bounded on the north and west by the Missouri River and on the north, east, and south by the Missouri River cut-off channel. There are 100 acres which are closed to hunting, but signs will designate that area.

An overabundance of deer prompted the U.S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife to request the three-day season.

Because of the large number of deer, hunter success is expected to be high on the refuge.
