Dear Santa: I am four years old, and I would like a scooter, some logs and a train. I live in the country this year. Thank You, John Thomason.

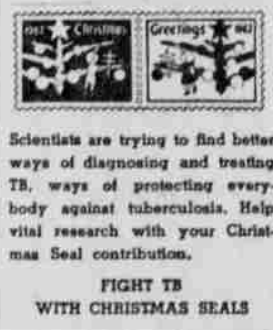

Mr. Cloidt was born June 12, 1889 in Plattsmouth, son of John and Gertrude Beise Cloidt.  
He was married to Rose Vorn-dran Oct. 26, 1915, at St. John's Church.  
She survives along with daughters, Mrs. Rose Mary Ulrich, Louisville, and Mrs. Gertrude Chovanec, Aurora, Colo.; son John J. Cloidt, Jr., Plattsmouth; nine grandchildren; sister, Mrs. John Bajock, Plattsmouth, and brother, August Cloidt, Plattsmouth.  
A lifelong resident of this city Mr. Cloidt attended St. John's School. For 15 years he worked for the Burlington. He began work at the age of 15, was chief clerk when he left the railroad's employ.  
In 1919, he entered the lumber business with his brother.  
In 1934, he started the Cloidt Service Station and was associated there until his retirement in 1953.  
Since his retirement his hobby was flowers. He remained active in church and civic affairs.  
He was a charter member of the Knights of Columbus, Past Grand Knight and Secretary of the Knights of Columbus for several years, was a trustee of St. John's Church and member of the Holy Name Society.  
Mr. Cloidt also served as a member and chairman of the Plattsmouth Cemetery Board.

**1,000 Peacetime Vets To Benefit**

Nearly 1,000 peacetime veterans in Nebraska, who have suffered service-connected disabilities, will benefit under terms of the peacetime vocational rehabilitation bill signed into law by President Kennedy, A. H. Duxbury, VA Regional Office Manager in Lincoln, said today.  
This bill extends the benefits of VA's war-time Vocational Rehabilitation Act to veterans who sustained service-connected disabilities while in the Armed Forces (a) during the period between World War II and the Korean Conflict, and (b) since February 1, 1955.  
The new law differs from the original Vocational Rehabilitation Act in that a peacetime veteran with a disability rated less than 30% must have a "pronounced employment handicap" in order to qualify. Another very important change is that there is no time limit or final date for benefits under the new law.  
Eligible disabled peacetime veterans are entitled to as much as four years of training or education at government expense.  
Veterans may obtain additional information at any VA Contact Office or from any county or post-service officer.

**Clean Garden Equipment before Storing It Away**

LINCOLN — Garden tools should be cleaned and stored before winter arrives so they will be in good condition and ready for the spring planting season.  
University of Nebraska Extension specialists recommend this practice because it will keep tools from rusting and corroding. The tools should be clean and dry when put away.  
They also advise that all leftover garden chemicals should be kept covered, cool and dry, but not cold enough to freeze. Tools and supplies can be stored on high shelves or ceiling racks in dry garages or basements.  
University specialists warn that special attention must be given to liquid sprays left against metal parts. They may clog and corrode. Any leftover spray solution should be emptied. The sprayer should be dismantled, and then rinsed well

with hot, clean water, or a mild ammonia solution. It should be hung until thoroughly dry. You can put it together loosely and store it in a dry place.  
Stakes, poles and cords should be cleaned and put away in a dry place. Spades, rakes and hoes should be scraped free of dirt and rust and then stored in a dry place. Applying wax to the metal will prevent storage rusting. You can also sharpen all your tools so they will be immediately effective in the spring.
