Population Growth To Exceed Increase In Farm Output

LINCOLN — Farm output is expected to increase 6 to 7 per cent in the next five years which is less than the anticipated population.

During the same period, supplies of government stocks of most agricultural commodities are expected to be reduced, reports Fred Olson, University of Nebraska Extension farm economist.

"The Secretary of Agriculture has determined that we need at least 600 million bushels of wheat for carryover, 45 million tons of feed grains and 6 million bales of cotton. When exports and domestic needs are considered, this is the equivalent of a 5 months supply of wheat, 4 months supply of feed grains and 5 months supply of cotton," Olson said.

"World trade in agricultural products should continue to expand in the next five years. The U. S. is expected to maintain its share of the expanded trade."
