New Certified Seed Directory Now Available

LINCOLN-A new winter edition of the Nebraska Certified Seed Directory has just been published by the Nebraska Crop Improvement Association, ac-cording to Richard Mills, Associate Manager of the Nebraska Crop Improvement Association. The directory lists the certified seed growers of hybrid corn, hybrid sorghum, oats, spring bar-ley, spring wheat, bromegrass, alfalfa, sweet clover, sorghum varieties, orchard grass, soy-beans, wheatgrass and sudan.

'This publication includes those growers whose fields met the field inspection requirements for certification. Final certification of the seed is not deter-mined until a representative sample of each lot of seed is tested in the laboratory for purity, germination, and other re-quirements and found to meet the standards for the certifica-tion of that particular crop,"

Mills explained. Copies of the new Nebraska Certified Seed Directory may be obtained free of charge by writing the Nebraska Crop Improvement Association, College of Agriculture, Lincoln, Nebraska, or by contacting your local county agricultural agent.


