wheat, barley, oats, grain sor-
ghum, rye and soybeans.

Loans and Purchase Agree-
ments on 1962 crop corn are
available until May 31, 1963.

The chairman reminded grow-
ers that good storage of a con-
dition and type that meets with
the approval of the ABC County
Committee, is a requisite for ob-
taining a Price Support Loan on
any farm-stored crop.

While the farmer himself is
responsible for storing a crop
covered by a purchase agree-
ment, the condition and quality
of the crop will be a deter-
mining factor in the amount of
the support he receives should he
decide to deliver his crop under
the support program at the end
of the season.

Deadline Jan. 15
For Tax Installment

The deadline for paying the
last installment on estimated
Federal Income Tax returns for
1962 is Tuesday, Jan. 15, 1963,
Richard P. Vinal, Director of In-
ternal Revenue for the State of
Nebraska, reminded taxpayers
today.

"If you have previously filed
an estimated return and events
occurring in the last quarter of
1962 indicate that your income
will be substantially more or
less than your original estimate,
you should file an amended de-
claration on or before Jan. 15,"
he said. This declaration, he ad-
ded, should be marked "amend-
ed" and filed with the same
District Director of Internal
Revenue who received the origi-
nal declaration.

Vinal said an original decla-
ration of estimated tax for the
year 1962 should be filed by Jan.
15 on Form 1040 ES by taxpayers
who first became liable for fil-
ing an estimate during the
fourth quarter of 1962.

Vinal said there are exceptions
to the general rules outlined
above. One, if the taxpayer
finds it necessary to file an
amended declaration Jan. 15,
or two, if he becomes liable for
filing a declaration for the first
time Jan. 15, he need not file
or pay on that date if he files
his final return for 1962 and
pays in full the balance of tax
he owes on or before Feb. 1,
1963.

He further said that farmers
who get at least two-thirds of
their gross income from farm-
ing have until Tuesday, Jan. 15,
1963, to file their estimated fed-
eral income tax returns for the
year 1962.

Taxpayers in this category
need not file a declaration of
estimated tax at all if they file
their final returns on or before
Feb. 15 and pay the full amount
of tax due.
Vinal advised that taxpayers
who have any other questions
about their estimate or federal
Income Tax return, should call
the Internal Revenue Office at
Nebraska City. The number is
924.
