## Public's Attitude Toward Fat May Alter Milk Test

LINCOLN — A change in the American public's attitude toward fat, may be the stimulus for a different type of milk testing program on Nebraska dairy farms.

High fat content isn't the best selling point for milk anymore, so farmers are asking "Why test milk only for fat?" "Why not test for solids-not-fat also?"

Purebred breeders have been the first in the state to become interested in solids-not-fat (SNF) testing, according to P. H. Cole, University of Nebraska Extension dairyman. With a public that desires milk rich in protein and nutrients, breeders may want to begin selecting for cattle that produce this kind of milk.

Many farmers look for a change in the method of milk payment if SNF testing catches on. However, Cole points out that present payment methods do take SNF differences into account, although indirectly. Payments allow that as fat content increases solids-not-fat increases at a slower rate.

Solids-not-fat testing is not likely to give any particular cattle breed a competitive advantage, according to Cole. The high fat testing breeds—such as Jerseys and Guernseys—will also be the high solids-not-fat testing breeds. However, the larger breeds with a higher milk output will produce as many, or possibly more, total pounds of solids-not-fat.

Cole reasons that unless dairymen are selling breeding stock, they probably can't get their money back from SNF testing until milk plants start making direct payment for it. Local DHA boards will make plans for purchasing SNF testing equipment when breeders indicate there is enough interest to justify the investment.

LINCOLN — You've heard of the young boy that got a free pass to the circus for carrying water to the elephant. He found he earned his seat in the bleachers.

Suppose he got all the free milk he could drink for carrying feed and water to an average Nebraska Dairy Herd Improvement Association cow producing 10,500 pounds of milk a year. He would earn it.

University of Nebraska extension specialists estimate he would have to carry:

- 61,200 pounds of water,
- 3,500 pounds of grain,
- 5,200 pounds of hay,
- 8,700 pounds of silage.

That's one reason Nebraska University authorities explain why mechanization of feeding operations has become so important in modern farming.
