Disabled Vets: Jan. 31 Is Important Date

Nebraska disabled veterans, a-long with their dependents, now on the nonservice - connected pension rolls, will have their pension checks discontinued unless they return the Income Questionnaire cards to the VA by Jan. 31, 1963.

A. H. Duxbury, VA Regional Office Manager in Lincoln, issued this warning to the nearly 3000 pension recipients in Nebraska who have not yet return-

ed their completed cards. He pointed out the cards were sent with the November checks with a printed warning that failure to return the cards by January 31, 1963, would result in discontinuance of the pension payments.
Since these benefits are paid

only to those disabled veterans or their dependent widows of children whose incomes are below cretain limits, the VA is required by law to receive an in-come report each year to sup-port the pension payments. Duxbury emphasized that the

law and regulations permit no-leeway — either the beneficiary reports his income or the VA. must stop payment as of Feb-
