Everyone is invited. This is a "Family Night" program which is observed on the last Sunday of each month by the Methodist Church.

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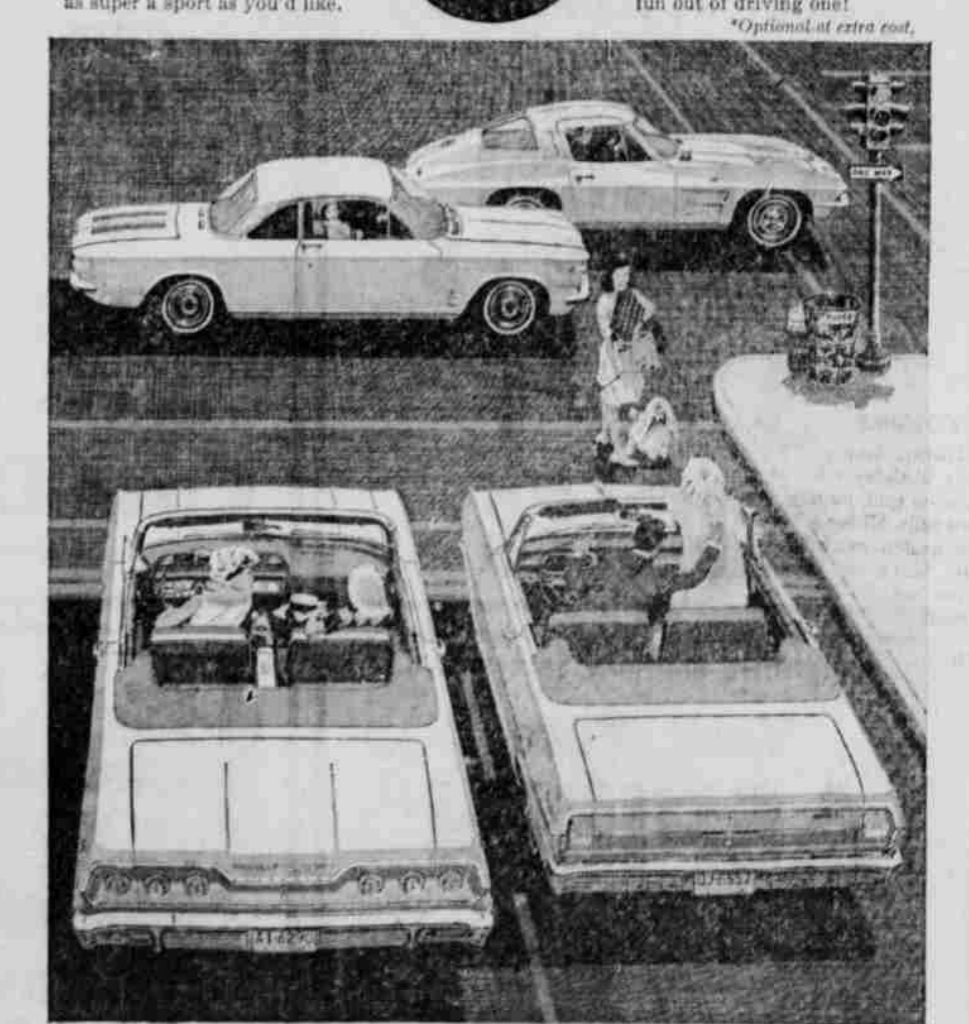
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
