Social Security Man Here March 27

The social security representative from Lincoln, A. J. Piccolo, will visit Plattsmouth March 27. He will be at St. John's Hall on Main Street from 9 to 1 p.m.

Piccolo, reminds Social Security beneficiaries who have total earnings in excess of \$1,200 for 1962 to file an annual report with the social security office before April 15, 1963.

If you earned less than \$1,200 last year and did not receive all your Social Security checks you must flie a report to get the checks due you.

You do not have to file a re-port if you did not earn over \$1,200 in 1962, or you were over age 72 the entire year.
