City Council Minutes

March 28, 1963
City Council met in regular session at 7:30 o'clock P.M. with the following present: Mayor L. W. Moore, Councilmen Lloyd Morehead, A. W. Huebner, Robert Aspedon, Emory Brink, Raymond Fuller, James McMullan, Donald Aylor, C. W. Rynja, City Clerk Erna M. Yennet. Absent: none.
Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.
Ordinance 1062 - 353 Second Ave. was present and discussed the proposed creation of the paving district for 4th St. from 2nd Ave. to 3rd Ave. in respect to the costs involved for the amount of benefits to be derived in the proposed paving, also the general obligation costs involved due to the City Park abutting the street was also discussed, after which motion carried that the proposed paving district for this area not be created.
Elmer Wurtele was present representing the tavern operators of the City in regard to the present Occupation Tax upon liquor licenses as per Ordinance No. 1026 passed April 23, 1962.
Motion carried that the matter be referred to the License and Judiciary Committee for further study and report next meeting.

A letter was read from the Board of Public Works requesting Council approval of the Board to install a 6" cast iron water main on Oak St. from 15th St. to 17th St. and on 15th St. from Ave. B to Ave. C at an estimated cost of approximately \$4,400.00 which will be financed by the Board. Motion carried that approval be granted as presented.
Motion carried that 3 street lights be installed as requested by property owners on Smith Ave. and recommended by the Lighting Committee.

Motion carried that the building permit for the proposed addition to the present Gambles Store be granted as requested.
Motion carried that the request for the rezoning of the James Yelick Sr. property from residential to light industry be denied.
Motion carried not to accept the rider to the present group insurance policy which was to continue to provide benefits to employees who retire and that same be returned to the Travelers Insurance Co.
Motion carried that the alley in Block 23, 50 Park Addition be vacated and that the City Attorney prepare an ordinance for same.
Parking Meter collections for the weeks ending Mar. 19 and Mar. 25, 1963 were reported as being \$274.00 and \$231.00, motion carried to accept as read.
Motion carried to accept and place on file the report of the Police Judge for the weeks ending Mar. 16 and Mar. 23, 1963.
Motion carried that a sewer district be created on North Tenth St. from Main St. north to Ave. C.

Game Officers Get Their Man!

LINCOLN — The Game Commission's conservation officers recorded a 98.99 conviction percentage for all violations in 1962. Of the total 1,393 arrests made, 1,379 violators were found guilty by the courts.
Carl Gettmann, section chief of the Law Enforcement Division, said the high conviction percentage "reflects high efficiency on the part of the officers as well as excellent co-operation by Nebraska's prosecutors and courts."
Fishing without a permit, having a loaded shotgun in a motor vehicle and operating an improperly equipped boat were the top three violations.
The 1,379 convicted violators paid \$18,645 in total fines, \$5,774.25 in court costs and \$4,025 in liquidated damages.
In driving more than a million and one-half miles, the officers covered fields, roads, woods and waters of the state. Patrolling was done on foot, by boat or canoe, in automobiles, aircraft and sometimes on horseback.
The law enforcement division has 43 officers — one section chief, one chief pilot-communications officer, five district supervisors, one officer-pilot and 35 area officers.
