

'Bees Fascinating,' Local Hobbyist Tells Rotary Club

'You'd find it fascinating to watch them work,' Raymond Harold Jr. said of bees in a talk to fellow Rotary Club members Tuesday noon at the regular club meeting.

He said he has been keeping bees as a hobby several years and now has three hives. He has captured two swarms, he said.

He said beekeeping is not dangerous; that bees are gentle by nature and will not sting if a person works leisurely when handling them. A swarm can be captured simply by brushing it off the tree limb or wherever it has come to rest, into a box.

Harold told about some of the intricacies of maintaining hives and of producing honey.

Bees have been known to travel as far as four or five miles in search of nectar and pollen for the "home" but much greater productivity is possible if hives are located close to plants with nectar-producing flowers, he said.

He advised his fellow club members to try bee-watching for a relaxing pastime.

One Rotarian remarked that beekeeping sounded "like a get stung" if you don't get stung."

Harold Edwards, vice president, presided at the meeting in the absence of the president, Dr. R. F. Brendel. Clair Julian, the club's new pianist, accompanied for singing.

 AN ORDINANCE ORDERING CONSTRUCTION OF STORM WATER SEWERS AND ALL APPURTENANCES AND WORK INCIDENTAL THEREON IN STORM WATER SEWER DISTRICT NO. 1.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLATTSMOUTH, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. Pursuant to Ordinance No. 1052, the construction of storm water sewers and all appurtenances and work incidental thereto in Storm Water Sewer District No. 1 are hereby ordered constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications now on file with the City and approved by the City Council.

**ORDINANCE NO. 1052
 AN ORDINANCE CREATING STORM WATER SEWER DISTRICT NO. 1 IN THE CITY OF PLATTSMOUTH, NEBRASKA, DECLARING THE ADVISABILITY AND NECESSITY OF CONSTRUCTING STORM WATER SEWERS IN THE CITY AND ALL APPURTENANCES THERETO AND FIXING THE OUTER BOUNDARIES OF THE DISTRICT IN WHICH IT IS PROPOSED TO MAKE SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLATTSMOUTH, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That the Mayor and City Council deems it advisable and necessary to construct storm water sewers and all appurtenances to serve the City, which are hereinafter provided for, and to pass this Ordinance for that purpose.

Section 2. There shall be and is hereby created in the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, a Storm Water Sewer District known as Storm Water Sewer District No. 1, the outer boundaries of which are the incorporated limits of the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska.

Section 3. That there shall be constructed for the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, storm water sewers with all necessary appurtenances and work incidental thereto in accordance with the plans and specifications therefore prepared by Henfington, Durham & Richardson, Inc. Special Engineers, and filed with the City Clerk on June 24, 1963 and approved by the Mayor and City Council.

Section 4. The sewers shall be constructed of cement concrete pipe, vitrified clay pipe and any other material deemed suitable and be storm water sewers.

Section 5. Said storm water sewers shall be constructed inside the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, and the location, terminal points and size of such sewers shall be as follows:

54 inch storm water sewer and all appurtenances to be constructed along the east side of 6th Street from 1st Avenue (also known as Pearl Street) to Main Street.

Section 6. The Engineer's estimate of the total cost of said improvements is \$30,870.00.

Section 7. To pay the cost of said improvements, the Mayor and City Council, after said improvements have been completed and accepted, shall cause to be

issued negotiable bonds of the City to be known as "Storm Water Sewer District Bonds." The cost of such portions of said improvements as are local improvements shall be assessed to the extent of special benefits upon properties found to be specially benefited thereby as provided by law. All special assessments shall, when collected, be set aside and constitute a sinking fund for the payment of the interest and principal of said bonds and there shall be levied and collected annually upon all the taxable property in the City a tax which, together with the sinking fund derived from the special assessments, shall be sufficient to meet the payments of interest and principal of the bonds as the same become due; said tax

shall be known as the "Storm Water Sewer Tax" and shall be payable annually in money. Such portions of said improvements which are not local improvements are declared to be general public improvements and for the benefit of all the property in the City. All of the said improvements are found and declared to be advisable and necessary for proper storm water drainage in the City of Plattsmouth, Nebraska as above provided.
