## Have You Proof Of Place, Time Of Your Birth?

School authorities require a birth certificate for children entering school for the first time. If records had been as carefully kept in the past, much difficulty and expense could have been avoided. People seeking to establish a delayed birth certificate should contact the county court of the county of birth for instructions if they were born before 1904, the date when Nebraska began registering births.

Examination of school records discloses the fact that in far too many cases, the census had been miscopied from year to year. Obviously, none of these can be used unless at least one coincides with some other kind of record such as an insurance policy over five years old or a baptismal record.

Other discrepancies have been found when, through carelessness, the wrong birthdate was sent to the State Bureau of Vital Statistics or the child's sex was wrongly stated. One can imagine the complications involved in the latter case when a marriage license is to be issued.

We may well ask, "Have you checked your birth record; is it on file in the Bureau?" A bill-fold size copy is available for general use. For overseas travel, it is not acceptable; a complete certified copy showing parents' names and places of birth is required.

When requesting a copy of your birth certificate, write to the Bureau of Vital Statistics, State Capitol, enclosing \$1.50. Give full name, date, and place of birth together with the names of both parents.
