Monday at 7:30 p. m., a parents meeting has been scheduled at the band room.

Tuesday and all weekdays through Tuesday, Aug. 27, sessions will be at 6:30 a. m. and 5:30 p. m.

Aug. 28, there'll be a 7 a. m. chalk talk in the band room and a 5:30 practice.

Aug. 29, there will be one practice, at 5:30.

The annual towel-admission intrasquad game is scheduled for Aug. 30 at 7 p. m.

Sept. 2, Labor Day, practice will be at 8 a. m.

School opens Sept. 3 and practice sessions will be at 3 p. m. thereafter.

Hale has invited 84 players to participate and most have indicated they will be out. Anyone else who wants to play should attend the first squad meeting—Thursday, Aug. 15, at 7 p. m.
