

Prizes Offered For Big Trees LINCOLN-Two hundred trees will go to the people who find and report the largest tree of 10 species in Nebraska, The Extension Service, in cooperation with the Game Commission, is offering 200 young trees of the winners' choice as an incentive to people to assist in locating the top trees in the state. A search launched last month by the two state agencies for the state's largest cottonwood prompted a flood of letters detailing not only large cotton-woods, but carrying information

on other species. As a result, the search has been widened to include 10 species of trees. The largest tree in Nebraska of the following species is being sought: cottonwood, American ut, green ash, linden (basawood), honey locust, ponderosa ed home Wednesday. pine, and red cedar. Karl A. Loerch, extension forester, requested people submit-

ting entries in the big tree search to supply the following information: species, girth, meas-ured at a point 41/2 feet above ground level; height, an approximatation will do; spread, and location as precise as possible.
