Only .20 Increase In City Mill Levy Seen

The City Council at a special meeting Friday night passed an Annual Estimate of expenditures for the year 1963-64 totaling \$183,090.48 in the general and other city funds and \$37,070.70 in the bonds and interest funds. These totals compare with \$183,865 and \$31,809.40 in the comparable funds for the fiscal year ended Aug. 12.

The budget estimate appears as a legal notice in today's Journal.

Keep in mind that the flowers are judged on the perfection of the flower.

Keep your plant free of insects and mildew.

Cut any plant you wish to exhibit at least three weeks before you plan to exhibit.

Chrysanthemums or roses you wish to enter as specimen flowers, should be disbudded several weeks before the show.

Specimen should be hardened overnight in cool water in a cool place.

Roses should be picked in a firm bud, and may be held in the refrigerator for several days.

Drivers Licenses Expire Sept. 1; Tax Due, Too

All Nebraska Drivers Licenses expire Sept. 1, County Treasurer Owen Scoles reminded today. Drivers must renew the licenses within 60 days after that to remain in good standing.

The Treasurer said an increase in fees will be in effect under a new law, LB 478, passed by the 1963 session of Legislature.

Renewals of Probationary Licenses for persons 16 to 19 years of age have been increased from \$1.50 to \$2; renewals of Regular Licenses, from \$2 to \$3; and New Probationary Licenses from \$1.50 to \$5.

Scoles also reminded today that the second half of 1962 real estate taxes become delinquent Sept. 1. As required by Nebraska Statutes, all delinquent real and special improvement taxes are to be advertised for sale in October.
