CAPITOL CORNER

Washington, D. C. (Special)—Attention has been focused in recent weeks on young people in the two national political parties. The Young Republican convention in San Francisco resulted in a win for a pro-Goldwater candidate, and as a result, some of the Democratic columnists have charged that the "fanatical" right, or the "lunatic" right, has taken over the whole Republican Party.

Of course, that is ridiculous. One only needs to look to the next West Coast political convention — the Western Young Democrats. In their convention these young people called for the resumption of diplomatic relations with Communist Cuba, a non-aggression pact with the Communist Captive Nations of eastern Europe, and withdrawal of all U. S. troops from South Viet-Nam, giving that crucial area to the Communists.

One might call these resolutions friendly to the Communists, yet no responsible Republican I know has charged that such extreme ideas characterize the entire Democratic Party.

I guess these young people must be letting off some steam, which it is easy to build up in these times with so many stresses and pressures at home and abroad. It is well to remember, though, that neither young group has much influence on national policies.

Speaking of young people, a recent Labor Department study shows that a youth who finishes his last year of high school will probably earn about \$70,000 more in his lifetime than a student who drops out after the 11th grade.

Further, a man, aged 35, with a high school diploma, now earns an average of \$1,504 more per year than a man with 20 years extra work experience but no high schooling.

Young people should give strong consideration to these facts before deciding to drop out of school. Also the fact that the jobless rate for those who have dropped out of high school is over 17 per-cent, way above the national average.

For nearly three years a man in Santa Monica, California, advertised over Mexican radio stations which are beamed into the U. S. that a "miracle tablet" he manufactured would effectively treat over 30 body ailments.

The tablets, made of dehydrated and compressed sea kelp (or weed), were sold through the mail. But postal inspectors charged him with mail fraud, a count dismissed when the man did not contest his conviction on another charge of interstate transportation of misbranded drugs. He was fined and put out of business.

Each month dozens of fraud cases are investigated by the Post Office. If you should ever suspect any advertisement or product received through the mail, contact the local Post Office.
