Area Students At UN Receive Scholarships

LINCOLN — Seven students from Plattsmouth and the Plattsmouth area have been awarded scholarships to assist them financially during their freshman year at the University of Nebraska, Elton Teten, director of financial aids and scholarships, has announced.
The University offers to superior students three types of scholarships: a gift-scholarship, a loan-scholarship, and a work-scholarship.

Teten said the work-scholarship provides the students with approximately \$300 for the year which will pay for half of his dormitory expenses. To earn this money, the recipient usually works about 10 hours a week.
Among the gift-scholarships are the University Regents scholarships, which provide \$204 or full tuition for a year. The Regents scholarship is awarded to the high scorers in their respective high schools and financial needs are not taken into account, as is done with loan- and work-scholarships and most other gift-scholarships.
