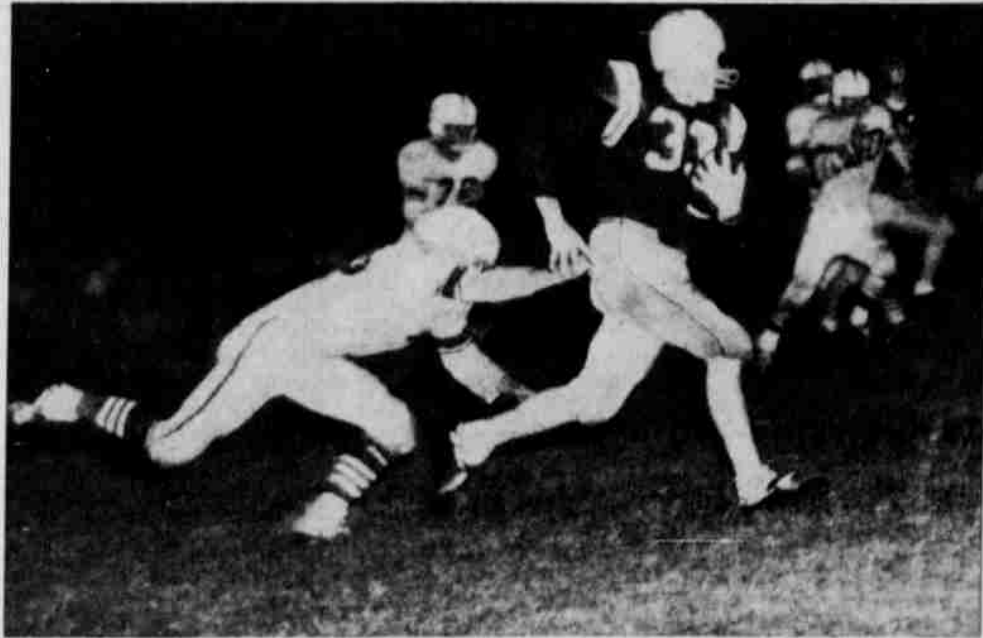

Heedum's 62-Yard Run Cements 19-14 Victory over Ralston

A 62-yard touchdown run by Roger Heedum in which he faked the defending safetymen almost out of his shoes put the finishing touch on a 19-14 Plattsouth High football victory here Friday night over Ralston.
A big turnout of fans saw a good, tough contest which was more like a mid-season game than an opener, so well was it played by two teams who were well matched.
It was comfortably warm for watching but more than a little too warm for player comfort.
As a result, three of five touchdowns were scored in the first quarter and the other two, one by each team, in the second half on breakaway runs when it looked as though the oppressive heat would prohibit further scoring.

Heedum's run came on a play the Blue Devils used only once. One a counter-play on 2nd and 7 from the Plattsouth 38, the 155-pound halfback broke into the secondary, outran the halfbacks and it became a question of whether the safety would stop him.
Heedum ran for the wide side, made one fake and then cut back to go to the opposite corner of the end zone. The safetymen was fooled, turned his back and Heedum beat him to the corner easily.
The score came after Ralston had bounced back from a 9-12 deficit and was a decided threat to win.
Plattsouth scored twice in the first quarter—first on a one-yard plunge on 4th down by fullback Bill Nettelmann after 3:52 had elapsed and Plattsouth had absorbed a 15-yard penalty from the Ralston 6; and then on Leonard Pritchard's one-yard keeper with 3:58 left after a 15-

yard pass on 3rd and 18 from Pritchard to Bob McClanahan and Nettelmann's 7 yard plunge for a first down on the one.
Ralston got its first score with 30 seconds left in the first quarter, Don Lane running five for the TD after quarterback Bill Haas had set it up with a 35-yard run. Al Rowe ran the extra point and Ralston was alive.
Plattsouth had to dig in and hold Ralston off most of the second quarter, the Devils having the ball on only two short series.
Ralston took out after the Devils in the third quarter. Haas hit Doug Corum with a 12-yard pass after a drive from the Ralston 43, to carry to the Plattsouth 21. But, Corum fumbled and McClanahan recovered.
Heedum's touchdown run was the fifth play after that. It became 19-7.
Ralston scored with 2:29 elapsed in the fourth quarter to make the game a sure-fire thriller to the end.
The touchdown was a 23-yard pass play from Haas to end Steve Neal. When Rowe ran the point, (19-14), Plattsouth had its task set, to yield no more.
The Devils pushed to the Ralston 13 in 11 plays but lost the ball on downs. Ralston came back to the Plattsouth 40 but fumbled the ball away and Carl Glup recovered with about a minute to go. The Devils were able to kill the rest of the time on two plays.
Plattsouth Coach Norris Hale Saturday singled out the defensive play of Glup, Dave Osthus, Ray Spencer and Heedum as outstanding.
He was pleased with his squad's showing: "It's wonderful to win," but was disappointed in the Devils' passing and in certain phases of defensive play. Penalties were costly, too, and took a touchdown away from us, he said.
He sounded a warning about the game here with Crete Friday, saying Crete is probably the best team Plattsouth will face this year.
Last Friday night, Crete defeated Beatrice, 24-7.
