2 Die as Car, Truck Collide

Charles Morrell, 85, and his wife, Anne E. 70, of Palmyra died Monday as a result of a car-truck accident at intersec-tion of U.S. 34 and Highway 1. The accident occurred at 11

Mr. Morrell was fatally in-jured and died at a Lincoln hospital. Mrs. Morrell was killed instantly

Sheriff Fred Tesch who investigated said Mr. Morrell was crossing Highway 34 from the south to go north on the Elm-wood road. The car was hit by gravel truck driven by Larry

Henggeler, 24, of Omaha. The Sheriff said the crash occurred in the right hand lane of traffic as Henggeler drove west. He said his investigation showed a grain truck had passed headed east on 34 just before the Morrells drove across the highway and probably obscured them from the truck driver's

He said no criminal charge is contemplated in connection with the accident but that a charge of failure to have his truck registered would be filed against the truck driver.

The junction is two miles south of Elmwood.
