While she took an active part in the activities of the school, she was an honor roll student, played clarinet in the band, was band majorette, drum majorette, member of the Future Homemakers of America, Girls Glee Club, small vocal groups and accompanist for small groups.

Ulrich, 54, suffered a fractured ankle and a back injury. Toman, 57, received a severe back injury and broken ribs.

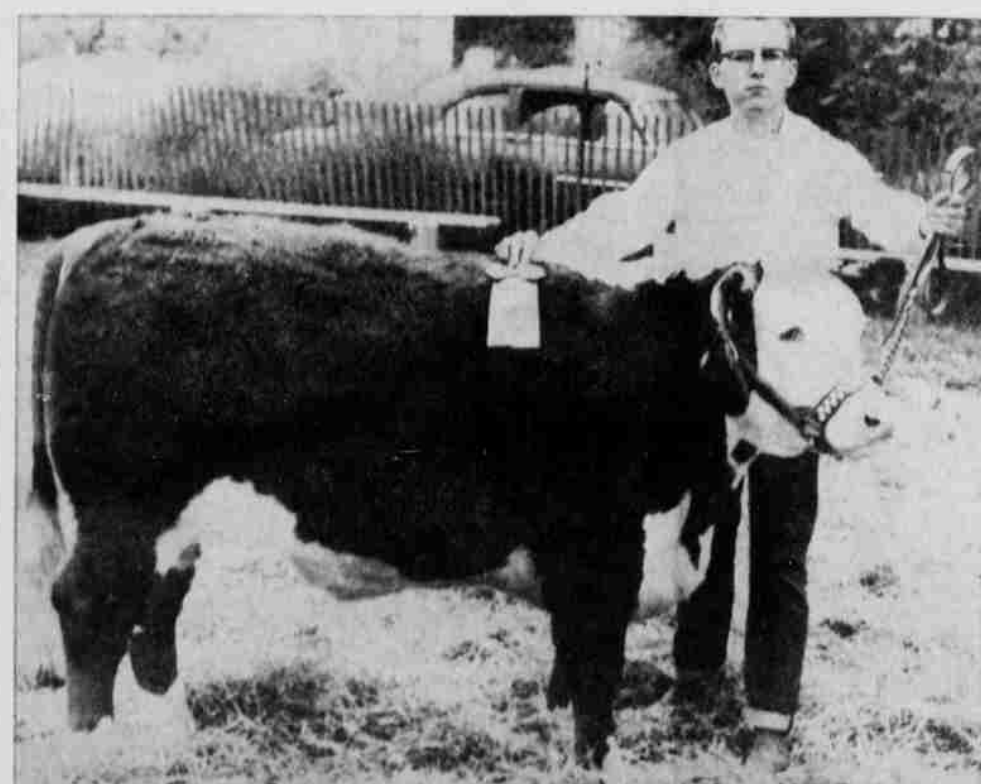
The men were taken by ambulance to St. Joseph's Hospital in Omaha.
