## USDA: Small Family Will More Likely Have Balanced Diet

LINCOLN — A food consumption survey conducted in 1955 by the U. S. Department of Agriculture among 6,000 urban and rural households in all parts of the country is still turning up interesting facts and figures, according to Kathryn Cooley, Extension foods and nutrition specialist at the University of Nebraska.

Here are some of the latest items of interest:

—A two-person household spends 24 per cent of its food dollars on meals away from home.

—Small households spend more per person than large households do on meat, poultry, fish, eggs, fruits and vegetables. —Only 34 per cent of households with six or more persons get enough of all eight basic nutrients recommended by the National Research Council.

—In contrast, 55 to 60 per cent of households with two to four members have balanced diets.
