Conservation Scholarships Are Available

LINCOLN—The National Wildlife Federation will provide several thousand dollars in grants to natural resources conservation students again this year. The Game Commission reports.

Undergraduate scholarships of up to \$500 and graduate fellowships of up to \$1,000 are being offered. College students majoring in such subjects as wildlife management, forestry, fisheries management, and conservation education are eligible for the grants.

Applications may be submitted by students having completed one year of college and who are citizens or nationals of the United States, or will be made in March, 1964. Awards will be made in March, 1964, for the academic year 1964-65.

Additional information and application forms are available on request from the Executive Director, National Wildlife Federation, 1412 Sixteenth St. N. W., Washington, D. C., 20036. Completed applications must be returned to the federation post-marked no later than December 1, 1963.

Since 1951, a total of 200 grants totaling \$250,000 have been made by the NWF to further her conservation education in America.
