Jonathan Cass DAR Marks Chapter's 50th Anniversary

NEHAWKA (Special) — The 50th anniversary of the Jonathan Cass chapter of the DAR was observed at their November meeting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Wiseman of Weeping Water with a covered dish dinner in the evening.

The members of the Fontenelle chapter of Plattsmouth were guests. Mrs. Dwight Cook of Nehawka is the Regent.

Miss Evelyn Wolph read the history of the chapter, which she had written. It was organized January 23, 1914. The charter was granted July 7, 1914 with 14 members.

The chapter was named in honor of Jonathan Cass, the father of General Lewis Cass, for whom Cass county was named. He served under General Washington in many of the principal battles of the Revolutionary War.

Jonathan Cass chapter has had two state officers: Mrs. M. J. Wickersham, recording secretary, 1915-1917, and Mrs. M. N. Tucker of Nehawka, state registrar, 1927-1929.

The chapter also has had on its membership roll a real daughter, Mrs. Elvira Tewksbury, who was born at Antrim, N. H., May 22, 1830, and died at Plattsmouth March 7, 1930. She is buried at Laurel Hill Cemetery, Omaha. Mr. Tewksbury operated a mill in Weeping Water for many years.

The chapter has contributed to the support of schools, sponsored by the National Society, sponsored the Good Citizenship contest, represented by Weeping Water, Nehawka and Avoca schools, sponsored the History contest awards given to the pupil having the highest average in American History in the three schools and with the Plattsmouth

chapter, given to Rural schools of the county for History Excellence.

The Junior American Citizen's contest has been of interest to many in Nehawka schools. The girls have received many State Honors as well as several National Honors.

During the Wars the chapter members were interested in War Work. They worked with the Red Cross chapters in Weeping Water and Nehawka.

Mrs. Oren Pollard, Mrs. M. J. Wickersham and Mrs. Lawrence Wiseman have attended Continental Congress in Washington, D. C. Bernice Wickersham and Imogene Pollard Bruce acted as pages at the Continental Congress.

For more than three decades the DAR has owned and maintained two schools namely, Kate Duncan Smith DAR school at Grant, Alabama and Tamasee school at Tamasee, South Carolina. These are for underprivileged boys and girls. They also assist with the support of eleven other schools in the United States.

Throughout the 50 years of this organization it has endeavored to carry out the objects of the Daughters of the American Revolution—to perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence, to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty and to promote institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge and thus bring relief and success to Humanity.

Due to a short life span, 60 to 70 per cent of Nebraska's fall pheasants will not be around for the breeding season next spring regardless of hunting pressure.

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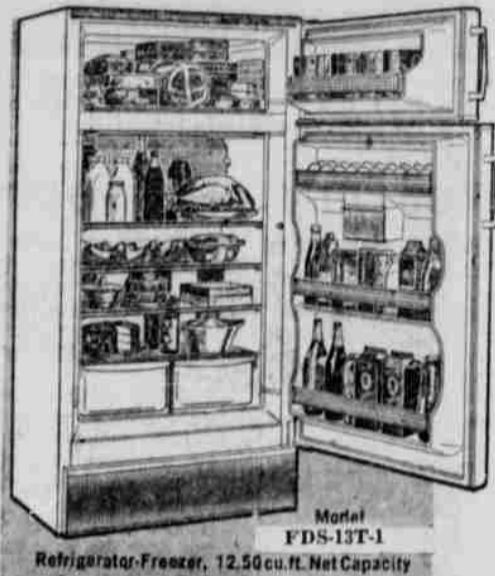
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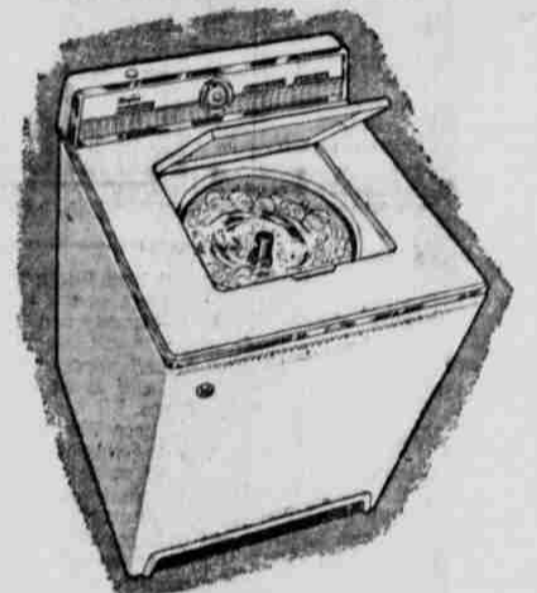
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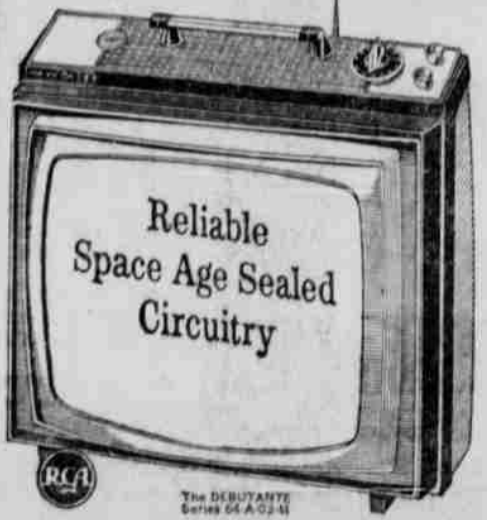


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Martin Rutt DAR Christmas Party To Be Dec. 1

Cattle Steady, Hogs Higher on Omaha Market

The Omaha market on Monday was hampered somewhat by uncertainties created by the national day of mourning. The fat cattle market managed a moderately active tone with prices on fed steers steady and fed heifers steady to 25c higher.

Top on steers was \$23.75, paid for one load weighing 1,125. Several sales at \$23.40 and \$23.50, others at \$23-\$23.25, bulk \$21.75-\$22.75, plainer kinds \$21.50 down. Best on fed heifers was a \$23 ticket, this for several loads, a few at \$22.75, others at \$22-\$22.50, bulk of the heifers \$21-\$21.75.

Cows were steady; canners and cutters \$10.50-\$13, beef cows \$12.50-\$14. Bulls steady at \$16-\$17.25, vealers steady at \$21-\$25. Feeders were steady, action on these classes was slow. There were steer calves weighing 314 at \$31.50, 400 pounders at \$29.50. Steers weighing 633 commanded \$25 and some weighing 699 at \$22.50.

Butcher hogs sold 50-75c higher, 190-250 pound weights \$14.25-\$14.75. Sows 25-50c higher; 270-300's \$11.35-\$13.

The sheep market was steady, woolled lambs mostly steady to 25c higher at \$17.50-\$19.50; shorn, steady at \$19. Slaughter ewes steady at \$4-\$5.
