Chicago-Bound
4-H State Award Winners
Gain Club Congress Trip
Nebraskans from Washington and Cass counties will
compete for \$500 college scholarships at the National
4-H Club Congress Dec. 1-5 in Chicago. A Douglas
County 4-H'er has won a wrist watch, and has a chance
of winning a congress trip in national competition. The
teen-agers eligible for the scholarships also won expense-
paid trips to the congress.
Trip winners and their pro-
grams are Lynn Wulf, 19, Blair,
agriculture; Larry Rybin, 16,
Omaha, automotive; and Gene
Wehrbein, 18, Louisville, beef.
Roxann Grasse, 17, also of
Omaha, won the wrist watch
awarded in the dog care and
training program.
Wulf, son of Mr. and Mrs.
Elmer Wulf, won a trip to the
congress last year but was un-
able to attend because of an
injury received playing foot-
ball. He won county champion
awards for projects in dairy,
crops, achievement and agricul-
ture. He also placed first in
showmanship in a district dairy
show.
Through 4-H, he says, he
feels he learned better farming
methods. He says he particu-
larly appreciates knowledge
gained in handling and train-
ing animals. He knows the im-
portance of keeping records on

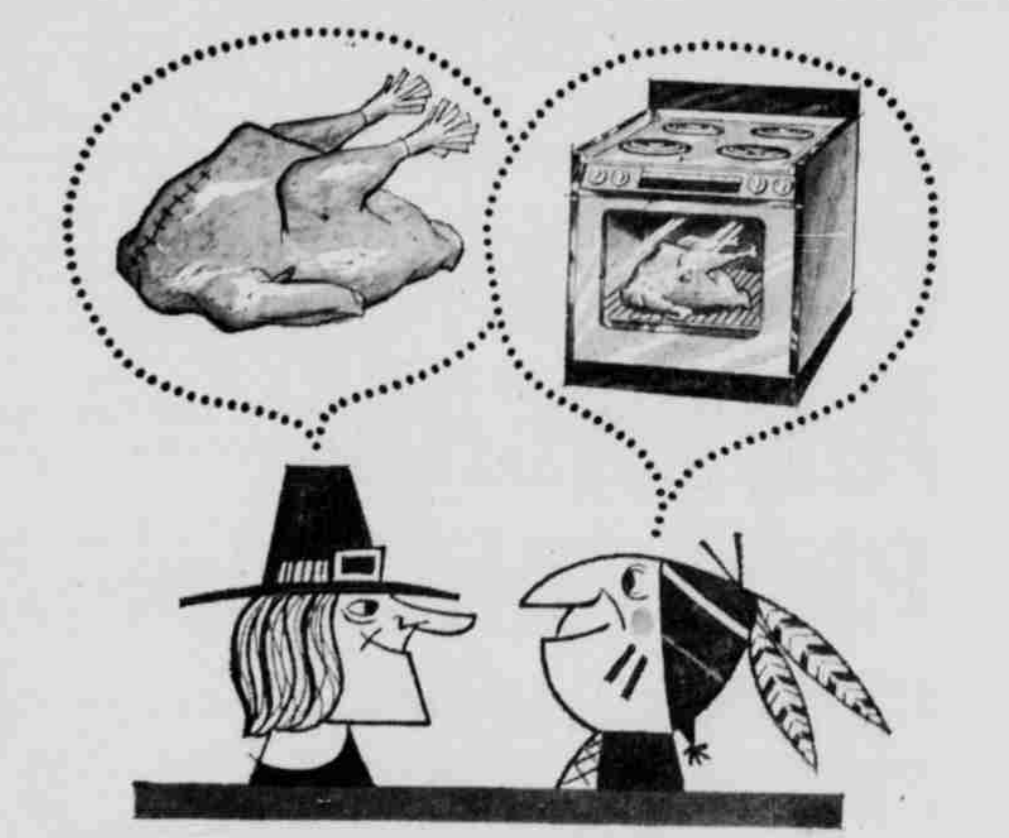
