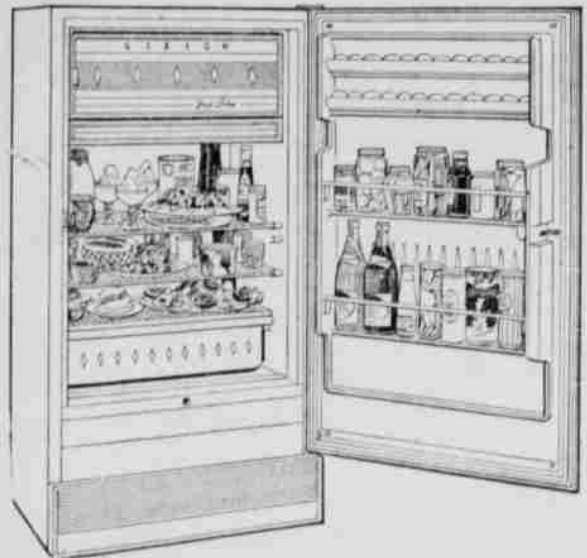

Ronald Roy McWilliams
EAGLE (Special) — Ronald Roy McWilliams was born Oct. 4, 1924, on a farm near Palmyra, to Roy E. and Ethel D. McWilliams.

He died Nov. 19 in a car accident at the age of 39.

He united with the Methodist Church at Eagle as a young man and later became a member of the Presbyterian Church at DuQuoin, Ill., where he lived with his family.

He was a graduate of Eagle High School, attended and was graduated from the University of Nebraska and received his Masters degree from Purdue University in Indiana.

A member of Canopy Lodge AF & AM in Elmwood, Mr. McWilliams was a veteran of World War 2 and the Korean War. He served in the United States Navy until February, 1946. He was recalled to active duty in 1951 and served until 1952.

He is survived by his wife Shirley, daughters Leslie Marie and Nancy Jo, and son Bruce Allen; his mother, Mrs. J. Clark Gonzales; sister, Mrs. Iva Jones, Muskogee, Okla.; a brother, Merle E. McWilliams of Denver; his step-father, J. Clark Gonzales; a step-brother, Charles P. Gonzales, Guthrie Center, Iowa, and a step-sister, Mrs. Hugh Taggart, Clarksville, Md.

Funeral services were held at the Eagle Methodist Church Nov. 22, with the Pastor from the McWilliams home (DuQuoin, Ill.) Presbyterian church officiating, assisted by Eagle Methodist Church, Pastor, Rev. Drake. Mrs. John Fischer, Eagle, was organist. Pallbearers were three members of Ron's Eagle School graduating class, Howard Root, Dayle Trumble and Wayne Weyers and three from Lincoln.
