WEST BOUND.
Passenger.....12:22 a.m.
Local Freight.....10:30 a.m.
Through Freight.....5:09 p.m.

This makes the east bound passenger arrive here 35 minutes later than formerly. The local freights carry passengers, and the west bound through freight carries passengers from Longpine to Chadron. East bound passengers can ride on the through freight from Valentine to Longpine.
