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PERSIA'S NEW SHAH.

Something of the Life and History of the Son and Heir of the Recently Assassinated Nassr-ed-Din.

Mouzaffer ed-Din, the present shah of Persia, is in easy circumstances. The royal treasure, which is kept in the vanits of the palace of Teheran, was increased enormously during the reign of his father, Nassr ed-Din. Sentinels stand day and night in front of a sealed door which leads to a crypt where millions in gold and silver are hid, as well as aggets of the precious metals. The shall, in order to be close to his treasure, has his private apartments immediately above the vaults. Besides these riches, which are estimated at over \$200,000,000, the shah also has a treasure shut up in one of the apartments of his palace. This is composed of pearls, rubies, emeralds and other precious stones, among which there is a magnificent diamond, which, on account of its rare beauty, is called "the Sea of Light," Just now the French papers are giving a good deal of space to the present shah of Persia, but probably the best account of him is given in the Journal des of each claimant to examine their

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
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
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
