ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION 1. The name of the corporation shall be The News Publishing Com-

2. The principal place of business Cherry County, Nebraska.

3. The nature of the business to be transacted by said corporation shall be to publish a newspaper, do job printing, electrotyping, lithographing and such other business as is incidental thereto. 4. The authorized capital stock of

said corporation shall be Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) in shares of Ten Dollars each, to be subscribed and paid as required by the board of directors. 5. The existence of this corporation

shall commence on the first day of April, 1859, and continue during the period of ten years. 6. The business of said corporation shall be conducted by a board of di

rectors, not to exceed five in number, including the President and Secretary Treasurer, to be elected by the stock holders; such election to take place at such time, and be conducted in such manner, as shall be prescribed by the by-laws of said corporation. 7. The officers of said corporation

shall be a president, secretary and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the stock holders, and shall hold then office for the period of one year, and until their successors shall be elected and qualified.

8. The highest amount of indebted ness to which said corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not be more than one thousand dollars.

9. The manner of holding the meet ings of stock-holders for the election of officers, and the method of conducting the business of the corporation, shall be as provided in the by-laws adopted by the board of directors.

ORGANIZATION

Temporary officers have been elected to serve until the first of July, and the books of the company are now open to receive subscriptions for stoc . Not to exceed \$3,000 worth of stock will be issued, and everyone is invited to join the company. As soon as possible the paper will be enlarged to 16 pages and complete market reports will be given: new material will be added to the office, and new territory entered for bus iness. Don't be backward with your subscriptions - sh res are \$10 each.






