NOMINATE TWO JUDGES

Democrats and Populists Hold Their Conventions and Name Winners

Pursuant to call the democrats of the 15th judicial district met here. last Saturday, Sept. 2, and at ten o'clock were called to order by Robert Good. The convention then elected Judge Crites temporary chairman and Robert Good secretary, after which the following committees were

Credentials-Murphy, Blewett and

Johnson and Patterson.

A short recess was then taken and the committee on credentials reported that all counties in the district were represented but Keya Paha and Rock, giving the convention 49 votes. Next the temporary organization was made permanent and these gentlemen appointed to draw up resolutions: Smyser, Sullivan and Patterson

A resolution by Smyser was then offered and adopted, as follows:

"Resolved, that the secretary proceed to cail the roll of the counties in this judicial district and that as each county is called the chairman of the delegation representing such county cast the vote for two candidates for district judge and that such balloting proceed until two persons have each received a majority of the votes cast, and thereupon a committee of three be appointed by the chair to wait upon the populist convention and request concurrence of that body in such nominations."

ballot, with the following result: Westover 45, Crites 32, Harrington 12. Tingle 9. Uner the resolution adopted the following committee was appointed, and an adjournment taken to 1 o'clock: Towne of Cherry, Wardlaw of Dawes, Murphy of Brown.

On reassembling the convention received word that the populist convention was ready for business and would like to hear from the democrats, and after a motion to increase the number to four had been lost, the committee last named proceeded to perform its duty, and returned shortly with the report that the populists had refused to accept the fiat of the democrats, but had appointed a conference committee and had nominated Westover by acclamation. After considerable sparring on motion of Smyser a committee on conference to arrange for nominations was named by the L. W. Handy of Valentine has all chair, as follows: Smyser of Box Butte, Wardlaw of Dawes and Fallon of Holt. On motion of Good, after a little discussion, the rules were suspended and W. H. Westover nominated by acclamation, and this was followed by a recess.

After the recess the conference committee reported that it had failed to agree with the populists in any particular, whereupod the committee was instructed to report that the democrats would agree to nominate any man who could receive a majority of the votes of each convention. This was agreed to and balloting proceeded with, resulting as below:

Meanwhile the populist vote kept being reported Harrington 40, scattering 6, excepting on the second ballot, when Harrington had 46. After J. S. Grange was in town the first the ninth ballot, Fallon of Holt moved to go into joint convention, which motion was carried by a vote 28 to 21.


