The Valentine Dairy Association.

The stockholders in the skimming station met one week ago today and formed themselves into a corporation to be known as the Valentine Dairy Association, the business of which shall be, as the articles of incorporation cite, "The manufacture of and dealing in dairy products."

The authorized capital is \$2,100, in shares of \$50 each, non-assessable. Forty-one shares are now taken.

W. B. Hughes, superintendent of construction for the company, is down from Gordon, where he is building a plant, and has engaged C. W. Massingale to sink a well back of Smyser's barn where the station is to be built. He is also contracting with our local dealers for lumber and informs us that he will be ready to commence building about the middle of next week, and expects to have things in business order about the 15th of April.

This will undoubtedly be a good thing for Valentine, as it has proved a success every place where one has been established.

At the Hemingford station, last summer, \$4,000 was paid out monthly, and at the present time about 27,000 pounds is taken in daily.

In answer to several letters of inquiry sent out by C. H. Cornell in reference to skimming stations, only one reply was received that was in any way derogatory.

It is the usual thing, we understand, to open up the new stations with a grand celebration and Valentine will prove no exception to the rule, as C. H. Cornell was appointed a committee of one to arrange for an opening program.
