About one hundred Indians came to town Sunday and during the afternoon and evening there seemed to be as many Indians on the street as white people. Sunday night there was a great pow wow the singing continuing all night prior to the departure of the Indians for the east.

Work is being pushed on the different buildings around town now. The court house is being laid with joists for the first floor, Quigley & Brayton's building is being prepared for joists by drilling holes in the Parker building and the drug store for the first floor, the Krug building is being lathed preparatory to plastering, the stone work being completed.

S. F. Gilman came to Valentine this week to look after the electric light plant being put in here. The work is progressing rapidly, four men being at work constantly on the poles wires and street lights. At the rate the work is progressing the lights will be ready for use by the 15th or 20th of June. The arc lights will be placed in positions so that every part of the city will be illuminated.
