A special dispatch to the World Herald, from Alliance, dated, May 30 was as follows: The spring term of the district court of this county convened here Monday with Judge James J. Harrington of O'Neill presiding. There are 129 civil cases on the docket and for the first time in years there is not a criminal case on the docket. The most interesting case for trial is that of Mr. Knight of the National bank of this place against the Thompson brothers of Lake Side, who are being sued by Mr. Knight, because the Thompsons, as it is alleged, used his name in connection with the Lake Side lottery without his authority. It will be remembered that the Thompsons raffled their ranch, which they claimed was worth about \$30,000, by selling tickets at \$1 per ticket and represented that the drawing was to take place under several well known and reliable business men of Alliance. After, it is said, about 2,000 tickets were disposed of the Thompsons raffled the ranch at Lake Side without any of the parties from Alliance being present and one of the Thompson crowd drew the number that won the same. Thompsons' attorneys, Messrs. M. F. Harrington, of O'Neill and Capt. Fisher, of Chadron, are here and the first skirmish is set for Friday.
