Forts To Be Abandoned.

Foreman M. O. Barnett and assistants, Hepperley, Turner and Lynn have returned to this city after completing three iron bridges in our county contracted for by our county commissioners. One at Brownlee and one at Edgar's crossing on the Loup. The other at the Barnes ford on the Snake. Washington, Feb. 11.—No less important than the creation of new posts and camps was the duty assigned to the army board of indicating which posts might be discontinued and also how the accommodations of the posts might be changed for the better. The board has solved these questions by submitting a table which, while it does not indicate any existing post for immediate abandonment designates a number of such posts as "temporary" indicating that they are to be eliminated gradually from the list of army posts.

The board says that its recommendations are based on a total force of fifty thousand men, infantry, cavalry and field artillery. The table, which also shows the recommendations to be provided at each post for troops and which does not include the sea coast artillery, is as follows:

Among the posts which are regarded as temporary are Fort Niobrara, Neb; Gibbon, Alaska; Missoula, Mont.; Rampart, Alaska; St. Michael, Alaska; Wala Wala, Wash.; Washakie, Wyo.; and Wingate, N. M.—World Herald.

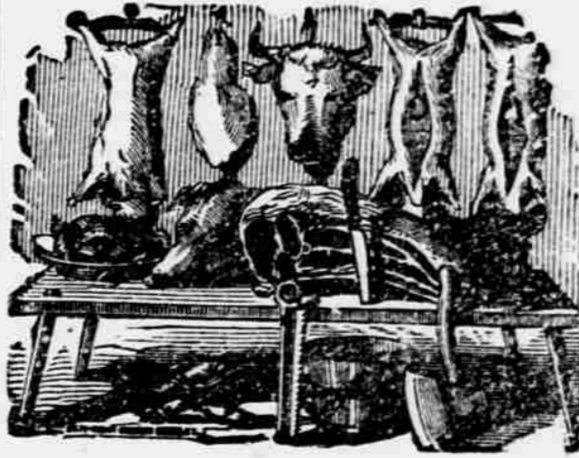
