Y., \$500,000; Miss Helen Gould, of New York, to various charities, \$400,000; Mrs. Vaughan Marquis, of Ashland, Wis., to religion, \$300,000; Mrs. J. P. Ryan, of New York, to religion, \$250,000; Mrs. Eugene Kelly, of Buffalo, to religion, \$250,000; Mrs. Edmunds Blaine and Mrs. Cyrus McCormick, to the University of Chicago, \$250,000; Mrs. A. S. Greenspan, of Topeka, Kan., to various charities, \$200,000; Mrs. Louise Sebor, of Middleton, Conn., to religion, \$175,000; Mrs. Margaret J. Bennett, of Baltimore, to various charities, \$150,000; Mrs. Mary Shannon, of Newton, Mass., to various colleges, \$123,500; Mrs. G. S. Burbank, of Pittsburg, Mass., to various charities, \$120,000; Mrs. F. H. Alms, of Cincinnati, to the University of Cincinnati, \$100,000.

Besides these several Chicago women have given various sums to the university there, the total aggregating nearly \$500,000.

Giants Can Be Grown.

Nature's Soap Factory.

The remarkable discovery of a cleansing fluid has been made in the mountains north of Phoenix by a party of prospectors. It is a geyser of natural soap, and three claims which have been located are called on the records of this county "soap geysers." One geyser measures fifteen feet in diameter, and the fluid is filled with a gray substance which resembles putty.

Several hundred pounds of the solid matter was brought to Phoenix, where it was treated thoroughly for its cleansing properties. It was found to be an excellent quality of soap, and removed dirt, grease or tar from cloth, and is said to clean silk or woollen materials without injuring the texture of the stuff.

The geysers flow continually and the supply seems inexhaustible. The story of the prospectors was at first regarded with considerable amusement, but after the quality of the substance thrown out of the geysers was ascertained, local capitalists entered into an agreement to furnish money for the development of the natural wonder. Chemists have not entirely determined the properties of the geysers' discharge. The promoters declare that a new and novel manufacture of soap will spring from this discovery.—San Antonio Express.
