Dietrich goes free.

The situation is passing strange. Charged with a monstrous breach of official honor, affecting not his own good name alone, but that of a great state as well, he was arraigned for trial before a court composed of men of profound learning and steadfast integrity.

But the cases were not tried upon their merits; his guilt or innocence was not determined. Proceedings to that end were stopped by the interposition of a purely technical obstruction, which the court held to be effective for the purpose intended.
