### Kinkaid Bill May Pass

Washington, D. C. April 16. The bill introduced by Representative Kinkaid regarding the settlement of western Nebraska lands is in a good shape to pass. It has been reported from the committee on public lands.

As reported from the committee the bill provides for the entry of one section of land instead of two, as originally intended. The bill also provides now that sixty days after the act has been approved 640 acres may be entered upon. not over two miles long.
