BEST IN MANY YEARS.

Government Report Says Wheat Crop Average Is Very High.

The monthly eport of the Department of Agriculture chows the average condition of winter wheat on April 1 to have ween 91.6, against 76.5 on April 1, 1904, \$7.3 at the corresponding date in 1903, and 83.1 the mean of the April averages of the last ten years.

The following table shows, for the principal winter wheat States, the averages of condition on April 1, the corresponding averages one year and two gears ago, and the mean of the corre-.ponding averages of the last ten years:

The average condition of winter rye april 1 was 92.1, against 82.4 April 1, .904; 98.9 at the corresponding date in 1903; and 87.9 the mean of the April averages of the last ten years.

The area seeded to winter wheat last call was officially reported by the Agricultural Department in December as 31,-155,000 acres. While these figures will oe revised in the May report there has seen little heard of the plowing up or abandonment of fields from winter kill-.ng and the loss in acreage is expected to be slight.

On the acreage sown and taking seventeen bushels as the par yield, a figure generally accepted in the trade, the condition figures of 91.6 suggests a winter wheat yield of 485,650,000 bushels. There have been larger areas sown to winter wheat, but only three times in the last fifteen years has the condition of the plant in April been better than that given in the above report. The April condition in 1891 was 96.9; in 1901, 91.7. The condition in April 1904, was the lowest in fifteen years, 76.5, owing to winter killing; 4,933,000 acres of the 32,000,000 acres planted being plowed up or abandoned.





ompany which pays rebates in any form, or any shipper who accepts them, is liable to a fine of from \$1,000 to \$20,000, upon conviction. It also prohibits the carrying of freight at less than the published tariffs. The Inter-State Commerce Commission is empowered to detect and prosecute violators of this statute. President Knapp of the Commission states that since this law was passed, rebate paying has been as rare as forgery.

CHURCH MAY TRY ROCKEFELLER

If Congregational Charges Are Proved Baptists Can Expel Him.

Under the laws of the Baptist church, John D. Rockefeller may be placed on trial on charges of extortion made by Congregational preachers and if the charges are proved Mr. Rockefeller may be expelled from the Fifth Avenue Baptist church, according to a New York dispatch.

It is the duty of the church, of its own motion, to put on trial any members who have been accused publicly of a misdeed of any character. The same obligation that rests upon the church as a whole rests upon each member of the church as an individual.

This being the case, exponents of the Baptist doctrine declare the members of the Fifth Avenue church will not be faithful to the church law if they do not institute proceedings against Mr. Rockefeller at once. Aside from this, it is the imperative duty of Mr. Rockefeller, according to the law of the Baptist church, to demand an investigation.
