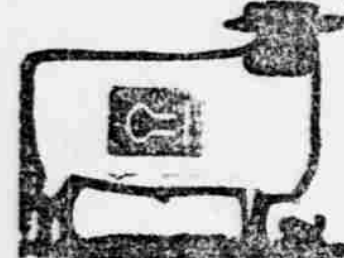

very helpful to their children by be-

point.

taught one week on her term and
now feels like a full fledged "school-
marm."

We have had interesting letters

Collett and Olive Bliss recently. We
certainly appreciate these letters,

against \$27 for the same month
last year, and the tuition for Oct.
this year is \$51 against \$22.50 for
Oct. 1905. We understand there

Some More About Kansas.

Of the 105 counties in Kansas,
85 are without a pauper, 25 have
no poorhouses, and 37 have not a
criminal case on the docket. In
Kansas, women have had full
municipal suffrage since 1887.

If during these 18 years women
had neglected their homes for
politics as the opponents of equal
rights prophesy that they will, half
the men in Kansas would have
been brought to the poorhouse by
lack of thrift and domestic indus-
try on the part of their wives,
and the rising generation would
have gone astray and filled the
prisons to overflowing, for want
of motherly care. Just the
opposite has happened. This is
another illustration of the fact that
"it is idle to argue from prophecy
when we can argue from history."

When a bill was introduced a
year or two ago to take municipal
suffrage away from the women of
Kansas, no wonder it was voted
down almost unanimously, and
"amid a ripple of amusement."
