NEVER HUNGRY IN HIS LIFE.

Man Lived Seventy-two Years Without an Appetite.

Archie McDowell, 72 years old, died yesterday of heart disease at St. Margaret's Hospital, West Side. He had been taken to the hospital from his room in the Armourdale Hotel last week. Mr. McDowell was also known as Archie McGruder.

McDowell was known on the West Side as a man who was never hungry. "I was never hungry in my whole life," he said recently. He had no family and his only responsibility was his dog, "Bobbie Burns." Since food was the last thing he thought about, his room rent, tobacco and a few clothes were his only expenses. Friends supplied those. The Kansas City Star published the following interview with McDowell Jan. 31:

"I know nothing of the pleasures of eating. A Thanksgiving dinner or a Christmas feast have no attractions for me. I have never been hungry in my life. I have not eaten five pounds of solid food in the last three months. I never crave food and, strange as it may seem, food hardly seems necessary to my existence."

"You surely got hungry when you were a growing boy, did you not?" he was asked.

"No, never. I used to go fishing with my boy companions and after we had been away from home all day on the creek banks they would complain of a ravenous hunger, but not I. I was not bothered at all and never thought of food and when I did eat it was because my mother made me do so."

"It was the same way when I went through the Civil War," continued McDowell. "Long marches and fatigue did not give me a desire for food. I had three years of service and was at different times under Buell, Sherman and Grant. During the retreat from Cumberland Gap, when we marched seventeen days all day and also nine nights during that time, I saw men almost dead from hunger, but I could not sympathize with them because I experienced none of the pangs. Sometimes when I felt weak I would chew a stick and be perfectly satisfied."

Mrs. L. A. Houck, manager of the Armourdale Hotel, where McDowell lived, said about his appetite:

"He ate scarcely anything. I remember that he took soup a few times, but he appeared to live almost entirely on coffee and other stimulants."

McDowell went to Wyandotte County in 1879. He followed various pursuits, farming, the dry-goods business and practicing law. Of recent years he had not worked. His wife died nineteen years ago. A grown son lives somewhere in the East, but McDowell had not seen him for thirteen years.

To Break Telegraph Combination.

Attorney General Jackson of New York has appealed to the Supreme Court of New York county for the appointment of a referee to take testimony on his allegation that the Postal and Western Union Telegraph companies have formed a combination to increase rates of service in that and other States. This is preliminary to his action to restrain the said combination, and requires that Messrs. Gould, Schiff, Jessup, Harriman, Mackay, Clowrey and other officials of the two companies shall testify before the referee. It is charged that this combination was made last January and that it has resulted in an increase of 5 cents a message of ten words, and also that the companies have agreed to establish at various places common offices, and to divide the profits and business received.

Belgian Ship Canal Opened.

King Leopold of Belgium, in the presence of a great throng, formally declared open the new ship canal from Bruges to the sea, designed to divert a portion of the Rhine traffic and attract shipping from Antwerp.

Campaign Expenses Limited.

Gov. Hughes has signed the bill amending the New York penal code so as to limit the expenses of candidates for public office. The maximum in the case of candidate for Governor is \$10,000, and for any other elective State office \$5,000.

Justice in Iceland.

The people of Iceland are so honest that there are neither prisons nor police in the country. It is said that there have been only two thefts in one thousand years.

One of these was that of a native who was detected stealing sheep; but as he had done so to supply his family, who were suffering for want of food, he was not punished, the shame attached to his condition being deemed sufficient degradation.

The other was by a German who stole seventeen sheep, and as he was in comfortable circumstances he was sentenced to sell all of his property, restore the value of what he had stolen, and leave the country or be executed. He left.
