### Judge Harrington.

The Crawford Tribune in its last issue gives a column and a half of its valuable space to the reproduction of an article which it credits to the Lincoln Daily News, with reference to the judicial campaign in this district. The article in question deals more particularly with the candidacy of Judge J. J. Harrington, and only incidentally mentions Judge Westover who, it alleges, is susceptible to the "Harrington influence." The article deals largely with the passage of a bill by the last legislature which the News says in its article was "to restrict the usefulness of an attorney who may have a brother sitting as district judge." And the writer adds the interesting information that "it was an open secret that the bill was to interfere with the relations of Attorney M. F. Harrington of O'Neill and his brother, who is a judge of that district."

It is true that a bill of this character, instigated by a railroad attorney, and passed by a partisan legislature, is now upon the statutes of Nebraska, and that it provided that an attorney could not appear as an advocate in cases in a court of which his brother was the judge, except by consent of the parties of the suit. It was as the News says an "open secret" that this bill was aimed at the Harringtons, but so far from being objectionable to either, it was most acceptable to both of these gentlemen. M. F. Harrington has always maintained that he would prefer to try his cases before some other judge than his brother, and he was the first and only attorney in the district to file objections to the trial of a case by Judge Harrington in which he appeared as attorney. This was done by him after the passage of the law in a case tried in Boyd county, in which a man was charged with arson—the burning of his place of business for the purpose of securing the insurance. M. F. Harrington was counsel for the defendant in this case and filed objections to the trial of the case by Judge Harrington, and Judge Westover went to Butte and tried the case. There wasn't any foundation in fact for the charge that Judge Harrington in any way favored his brother in the trial of cases brought before him as everyone knows who has had any business in his court; but if there had been the passage of this law removes that objection by compelling an exchange of judges where objections are filed.

There is no doubt but that the influence which inspired the introduction and passage of this bill would like to see Judge Harrington defeated and M. F. Harrington dis-barred from practice. They are both strong anti-corporation men, and by their decided stand for the people as against the corporations, have incurred the enmity of the railroads and corporation interests in this district. We believe that the voters of this district approve of the action of Judge Harrington compelling the Northwestern railroad to furnish cars for the shipment of hay from Holt and Rock counties by writ of mandamus, when it was impossible to get them in any other way, and we believe they will manifest their approval of his administration of the law by giving him an increased majority this fall.
