Are Displeased With Miss Stoner

Conduct of Preceptress at Peru During Searson Trouble Offends the State Board

Report She Will Be Discharged—Searson Exonerated and Resumes His Duties.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 12.—Prof. J. W. Searson has been exonerated by the state board of education and resumed his duties yesterday as professor of English literature in the Peru state normal school. Only the formality of recording the exoneration remains, and this will be done at the next meeting of the state board.

The report of exoneration comes from a committee appointed last summer to investigate the charge that Prof. Searson had attempted to commit a criminal assault upon Miss Katherine Hudson. Immediately after Prof. Searson was acquitted of the same charge in the district court at Auburn the state board met. James Delzel and State Treasurer L. G. Brian, two members of the state board, comprising a majority of the special committee, reported verbally that they exonerated Prof. Searson. H. M. Childs, the other member of the committee, was unable to be present. It is said the report of the committee will be accepted at the next meeting of the full board. Prof. Searson, who had been relieved of his duties as an instructor while preparing for trial in the district court, was instructed to resume his duties yesterday.

It is reported at the state house that Miss Stoner, the preceptress, will be discharged on account of her testimony and action in relation to this case. Her testimony was merely in relation to what she had been told by Miss Hudson.—World-Herald.
