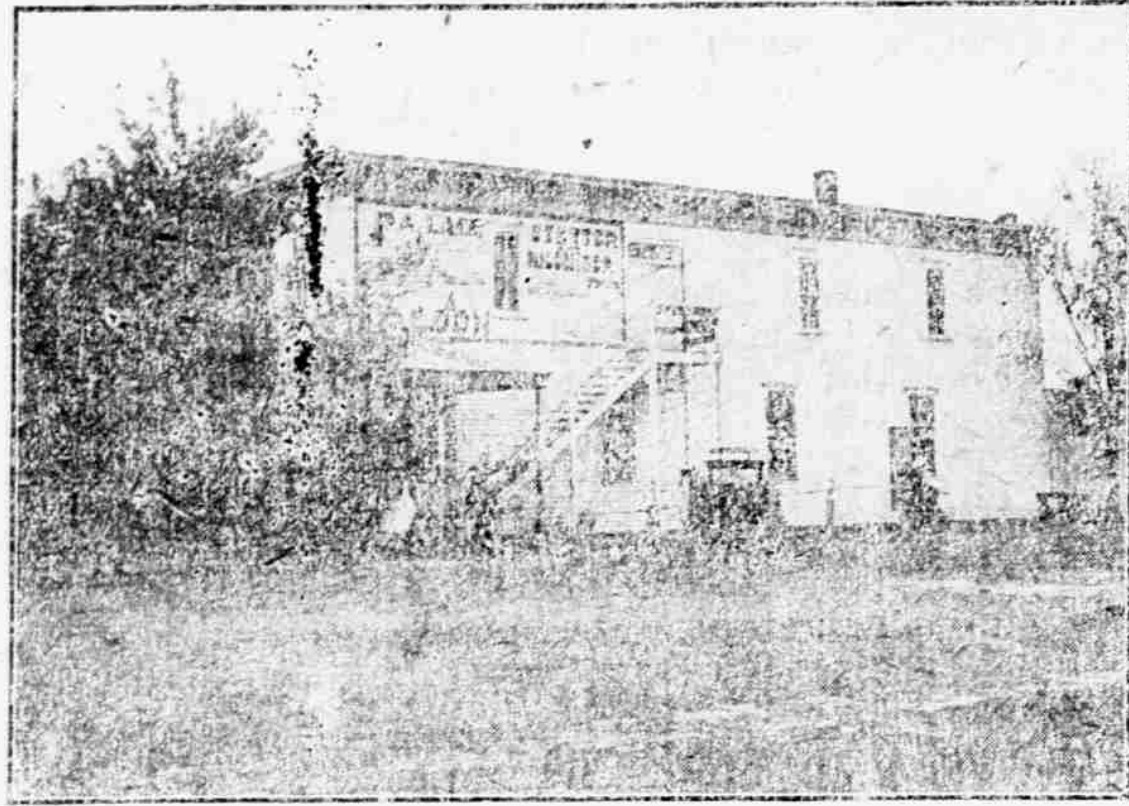

and restaurant trade which demands big cuts and light bone, the practice being to bone before cooking. In putting in such roasts thickness of loin and rib is an essential quality. What Angus cattle have accomplished in show ring performances is a well written history but every day in the market centers of the country those spectacular feats are being duplicated if not heralded to the world. As cattle of commerce the blacks have no superior. They are popular in the chill room because the retailer wants the kind of meat they furnish and the man who wields the cleaver on the block merely reflects public demand. The beef made beneath a black hide may be equalled but it is never excelled, and demand for it is proportionate to its excellence.
I believe that above is as able authority as we could get on beef cattle and is very encouraging to black cattle men. I found long ago that they are easily kept being in good thrifty condition the year round, always in good flesh and weigh more than you think thus disappointing you in the right manner. Being hornless is no small factor in their favor. They have topped the Chicago Christmas market for fourteen years without a break. They have won more prizes at the International than all other breeds combined.
Since we are raising stock for profit and pleasure my friends won't you think the foregoing facts over carefully and join the black throng that are setting their leaders for higher prices than any classes of livestock known today. I hope to live to see the day when the prolific nature of Cherry county will be dotted with Angus cattle the best every sense of the bovine kind. C. S. Reagon.

Notice.

We have the following announcement from Major Shockey of Ft. Niobrara which he requested us to print and ask other papers to copy:
"Office of Chief Quartermaster, Dept. of the Missouri, U. S. Army, Omaha, Nebr., March 5, 1908.—By order of the president of the United States:
"All persons are hereby prohibited from shooting, trapping, catching, or taking, dead or alive, by any device, on the Fort Niobrara military reservation in Nebraska, any sharp or pintail grouse, prairie chicken, quail (bob white), wild ducks or geese of any variety; any woodcock, snipe, Wilson-snipe, jack-snipe, plover, Virginia-rail, king-rail, sora, doves, meadow-larks, robins, or any birds of any species; any beaver, otter, jack-rabbit, cottontail-rabbit, grey, fox or red squirrels, or any other game or wild animals; or any fish of any species.
"The violation of this, will subject offenders to arrest and prosecution in the U. S. courts.
