Obituary.

Sarah J. Wimple was born in Narage, Canada, Nov. 16, 1837. When she was yet a child her parents moved to Eaton county, Mich., where her girlhood days were spent and where she was married to Alonza Boyer March 19, 1854. In 1884 she moved with her husband to Nebraska where they have since resided, with the exception of a few years spent in Missouri.

Mrs. Boyer united with the Baptist church early in life, and on coming to Valentine transferred her membership to the Methodist church at this place where she had her membership at the time of her death.

She died of heart failure at the home of her son, Grant Boyer, at 12 o'clock Sunday night, April 11, 1909, at the age of 71 years, 4 months and 25 days.

She was a christian mother and a loving wife. She leaves behind her husband and four children to mourn her loss. Mrs. Horace Todd, the eldest, lives north of Sparks; Grant Boyer and family live in Valentine; Mrs. Commo-

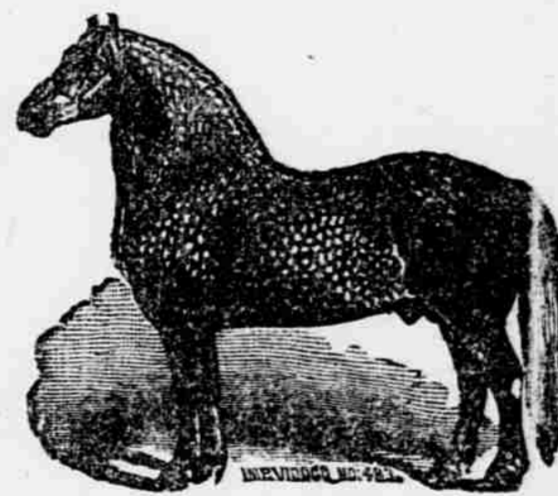

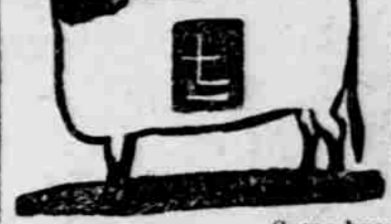
