### Water Bonds Carry.

All our readers, all Cherry county and many people up and down our state will be pleased to know that the water and electric light bonds voted for Tuesday carried by a large majority, 162 for and 17 against, which is almost unanimous for good water and electric lights to be furnished by our city.

The city dads are going to get busy and begin work as soon as possible to construct our new reservoir and begin work on the proposed dam. Bids will be called for in whole or in part to construct the dam and reservoir and lay the pipes. We suggest that some of our citizens who are familiar with construction work of this nature submit bids for the work that they can do and they will be favored in small contracts where it is possible to do so if the bids are reasonable.

Valentine is taking the lead as a municipal ownership city in Nebraska and our village board should exercise precaution and good judgment in their division and quality of this work and in the selection of machinery and the cost of same. Valentine will grow and our electric light service will double. It will mean something to be a member of our village board and faithful performance of duty to our citizens will deserve a high tribute of praise, both at home and abroad and Valentine will loom up as the most progressive city under the direction and guidance of honest and intelligent citizenship.
