The Water Proposition.

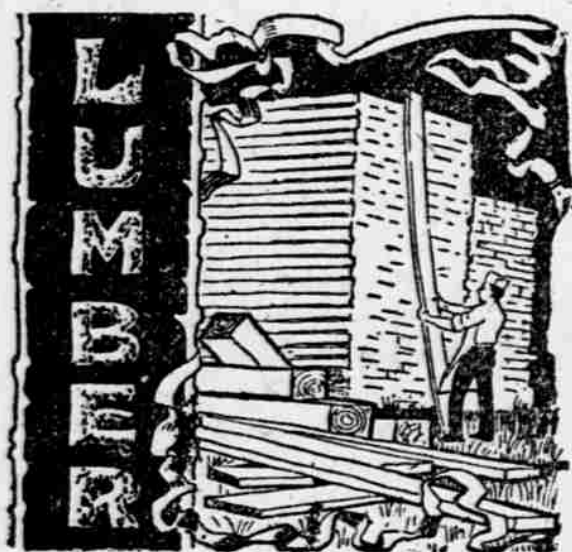

Latest Election News

There was no excitement to speak of in the primary election Tuesday, excepting for the offices of county treasurer and superintendent.

Miss Jordan's friends were found to be the thickest and she got the vote that Daniels and Parker thought they ought to have. Mr. Parker was recognized all the time as the strong candidate, and it was to beat him that required the valient work of the Jordanites and they plucked many a flower from the Daniels' garden to out-count the Parkerites. But they did it and Daniels, no doubt, rejoiced in the thought that he was at least a factor when he couldn't be the whole cheese. So, while the Parkerites plucked a vote or two, here and there, whole battalions were being sloughed off to Miss Jordan, which put her safely in the lead.

In Valentine some of the voters mis-understood and voted the democratic ticket, excepting for Miss Jordan and Mr. Funke and now the Parkerites claim there was a double cross on them because their slate was Parker and Story. This accounts for the vote of Story and Parker running so close together, and where one went high the other followed mildly.

Miss Jordan wins out by some 60 to 70 votes with present returns and seven precincts to hear from that will likely keep the plurality.

Miss Cora Thackrey is 6 or 8 votes in the lead with present returns, and precincts to hear from will increase the plurality.

Thursday, Sept. 2nd.

First race— $\frac{1}{4}$ mile and repeat, free for all. Purse \$75, 1st \$37.50, 2nd \$22.50, 3rd \$15.00

Second race— $\frac{1}{2}$ mile dash, for Rosebud and Pine Ridge horses. Purse \$50, 1st \$25, 2nd \$15, 3rd \$10.

Relay race $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile, first heat. Purse \$200, 1st \$100, 2nd \$60, 3rd \$40.

Friday, Sept. 3rd.

First race— $\frac{1}{4}$ mile, pony 14 hands and under. Purse \$50, 1st 25, 2nd \$15, 3rd \$10.

Second race— $\frac{1}{4}$ mile and repeat, free for all. Purse \$200, 1st \$100, 2nd \$60, 3rd \$40.

Relay race— $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles, second heat.

Saturday, Sept. 4th.

First race— $\frac{1}{4}$ mile dash, free for all. Purse \$100, 1st \$50, 2nd \$30, 3rd \$20.

Second race— $\frac{3}{4}$ mile dash for Cherry county, Pine Ridge and Rosebud horses. Purse \$75, 1st \$37.50, 2nd \$22.50, 3rd \$15.

Relay race— $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles, third heat.

The following rules will govern all races in this program

Rosebud, Pine Ridge and Cherry county horses must have been owned at their respective homes for at least 60 days prior to day of race.

In the relay race cowboy saddles are to be used, each rider to have three horses in charge of one assistant, the rider to saddle, unsaddle, mount and dis-mount unassisted and to ride three $\frac{1}{2}$ mile heats each day, the rider winning the greatest number of $\frac{1}{2}$ mile heats during the three days to be declared the winner.

The entrance fee is 10 per cent of purse. Five to enter and three to start or race will be declared off. Horses must be entered before 9 o'clock, p. m. the day previous to each race.
