In some way he got surrounded by the flames and in trying to save his team he was badly burned which resulted in his death Friday morning about 4 o'clock. Mr. Thomas was an old settler of Cherry county and was about 66 years old. He leaves a wife and four children to mourn his death. The remains were laid to rest in the Wood Lake Cemetery Saturday afternoon.

The jury, which was composed of extra good men, considered that the state made no case against Combs for they decided on a verdict of not guilty in about twenty minutes.

In this case the prosecuting attorney, J. Y. Stevens, was assisted by Judge Neill C. Marsh, while the defendant was represented by Powell & Taylor, of Camden, and Judge A. P. McMahon and Mahony & Mahony of this city.—El Dorado Ark. Tribune.

### Fort Niobrara A Remount Station.

Talk is revived in army circles that Fort Niobrara, the abandoned army post in Northern Nebraska, may be made a remount station to prepare horses for the cavalry service. At present there are but two such stations, Forts Reno and Keogh.

There are now fifteen cavalry regiments, requiring about 13,000 horses. As the average life of a cavalry horse in the service is about ten years it requires about 1,300 horses a year to keep up the supply. It takes about two years to prepare the horses for service and a third remount station is said to be needed.

Fort Niobrara reservation is said to be admirably adapted to such a purpose and the war department has declined to permit it to pass out of its control.

General Aleshire, quartermaster general of the army, who was in Omaha a few days ago, is planning on returning later in the fall and it is expected that he will then make an inspection of the Niobrara reservation with this end in view.—Omaha World Herald.
