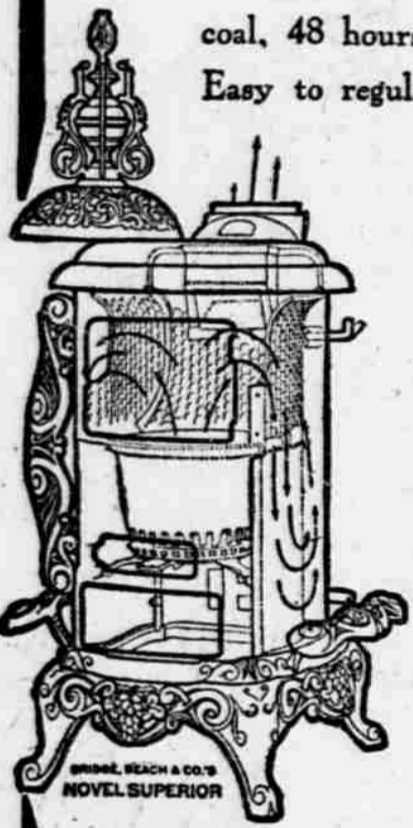

Sheriff Rosseter left Tuesday morning for Lincoln with Wm. Dillon and Grant Warren who were sentenced to the penitentiary for two years each.

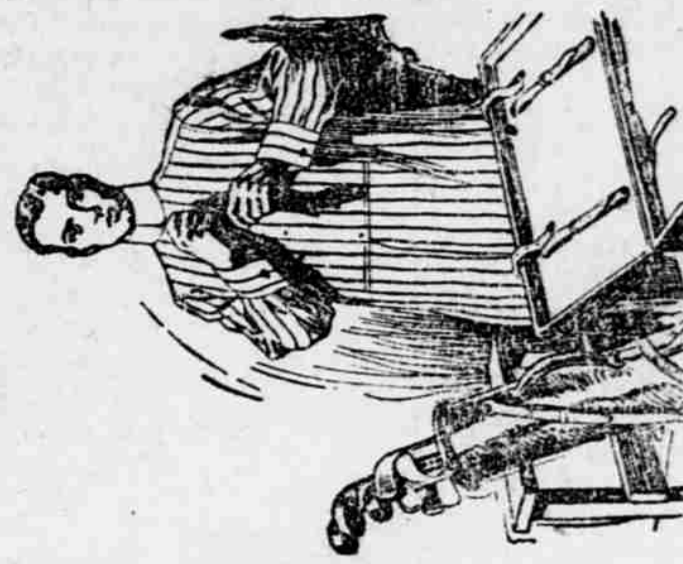
Julius Bauer was down from Kilgore last Saturday on business. Julius made this office a friendly call while in town and left a couple of plunks on subscription.
