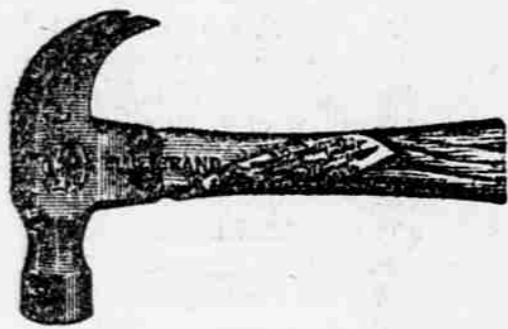

William Erickson Home From Canada

Wm. Erickson returned Sunday from his Canada trip. He's well pleased with what he saw and favorably impressed with the country. He will probably hook a few teams together and go back in the spring. Thinks he can raise wheat up there and make more money than raising Whiteface steers. Can put in 300 acres of wheat with two men and six teams that will make at least 20 bushels per acre and possibly 40. This will net \$5,000 a year after paying expenses of threshing and hauling. This is a minimum estimate and should be enlarged to suit the imagination of the farmer who tills the soil. A good farmer will raise 40 bushels of wheat per acre, and the average yield is 31 bushels and over the past year.

We are not trying to boom Canada, but telling the story in a mild way as we heard it from Mr. Erickson, Sunday, upon his return.

Says it's warmer in Calgary than it is here and coal is plentiful. All you can haul with two horses for \$1.00 a load, or in many places you may find coal on your own farm.

Homesteads up there and pre-emptions to each farmer who are required to live three years on the land to obtain title.

The land is going fast. There is a great rush. We are tempted to try farming in our old age under such inducements, but we're afraid they don't guarantee the weather so far north to be good. We'd also want a farm like we once had an application for from a Swede man down east, who had read in a Swedish paper that we were doing a real estate business in Cherry county. We received a letter from him, wanting to know if there was plenty of homestead land in Cherry county? If there was he wanted the numbers of all the good land and would like a farm with plenty of good farming land, with timber on it, and running water. Would like springs on the land, and situated near a school and not far from town. And couldn't I find two or three quarters of such land together so that his son and son-in-law could be close to him. In addition to this I must guarantee the soil to be good. I forgot to answer his letter or I might have heard more from him.

Ye scribe drove down to Sparks with Jake Geyer Monday. Jake was on his way over to Tripp county, where he has a job building a school house. We had business with the Lord-Mayor of Sparks and closed a deal for one of his houses in Valentine. The other is for sale cheap and will be sold soon.
