

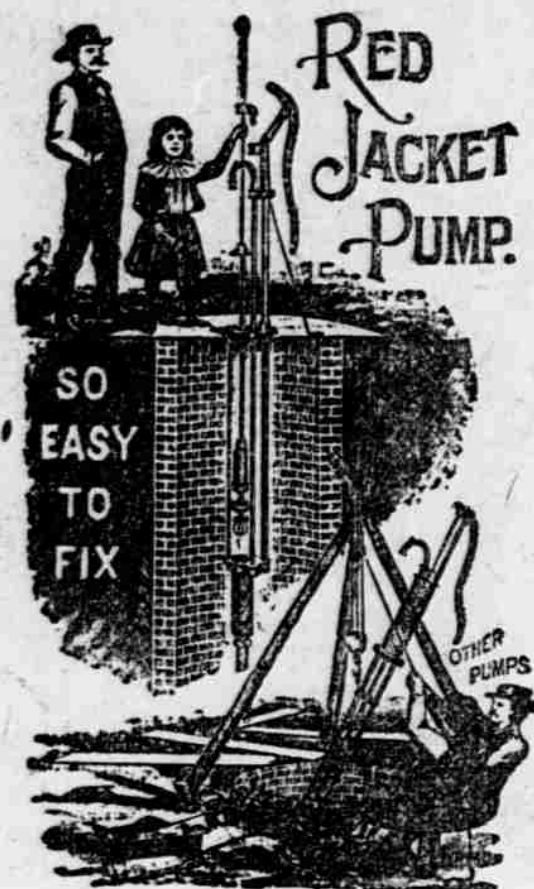

The board of county commissioners of Cherry county met pursuant to the call of the county clerk, having been called in session for the purpose of opening bids for the construction of two steel bridges across the Niobrara river, known as the Adamson and Lavaca bridges, and for the transaction of any other business of the county properly presented. Present: James Mone, chairman, and John A. Adamson.

On consideration of the bids on file with the county clerk the letting of the contract was postponed to April 26.

The board entered into a contract with the Canton Bridge Co. for the construction of two steel bridges in Cherry county, one known as the Adamson bridge, located about 12 miles southwest of Valentine, and the other known as the Lavaca bridge, located 18 miles southeast of Gordon.

The board proceeded to view the grading and bridge across the Minnechadusa near Valentine and instructed the road overseer of district No. 5, to repair same.

The county clerk is instructed to advertise for bids on a contract for certain road work to be done in road district No 6, Crookston precinct, according to specifications to be submitted to bids by J. A. Adamson, county commissioner, who will be in Crookston on Saturday, May 14, at 10 a. m.

The county clerk is instructed to call for bids for the furnishing of the following material: 12 heavy grading plows, 9 scrapers.

The commissioners established a public consent road on the section line between sections 31 and 32, tp 34, r 27, the village of Valentine having waived all claims for damages.

April 27, 1910.

A refund of \$11.50 was ordered made to W. C. Lyon of Lavaca precinct on tax receipt No. 3205, for the year 1903, on account of erroneous assessment.

The application of Jennie M. Smith of Sioux City, Ia., for a refund of real estate taxes paid on lot 4, ssws, nsws, section 3, tp 27, r 27, was rejected.

The county clerk is authorized to return to W. E. Haley, agent, the official bond furnished by him to E. B. Quible on Jan. 1st, same having been rejected by the board at their January meeting.

The appointment of Charles E. Swanson to the office of deputy county treasurer, was approved and his bond fixed at \$10,000.

The official bond of D. F. Story, county superintendent, furnished by the Lion Bonding & Surety Co., of Omaha, in the sum of \$1000 was approved, said bond to take the place of the personal bond filed by Mr. Story on Jan. 6, and approved by the board of commissioners.

A refund of \$4 10 was ordered made to Ira Hawk on tax receipt No. 2282, for year 1909, he having been erroneously assessed with personal property in Cherry county.

Alva Green was appointed deputy surveyor and his official bond approved.

A refund of \$4 63 was ordered made to Obe Church he having been doubly assessed for year 07.

A refund of \$6.66 was ordered made to C. A. Hoyt on personal taxes paid by him for year 1909.

A refund of \$3.00 was ordered made to Geo. McCubbin for taxes paid by him for year 1909.
